# **Clifton LitFest 2023**

## Friday 10th to Sunday 12th November

Following the first three successful events, we extend a warm welcome to the fourth Clifton LitFest, featuring over the weekend an eclectic programme of talks, walks, workshops, panels, poetry and music. Here's a taste of what is in store.

The Festival opens on Friday night with our Bristol-based keynote speaker, **Professor Alice Roberts**, distinguished polymath, biological anthropologist, author and broadcaster, winner of the Inaugural Royal Society David Attenborough Award for outstanding public engagement with science. In conversation with David Parker, Alice uncovers a history of Britain through burials.

This year we pay tribute to Bristol's global reputation for wildlife film and photography, with talks by BBC cameraman and whale expert **Doug Allan**, TV presenter and founder of birdwatching 'Flock Together' **Nadeem Perera**, **David Parker** on Exmoor film-maker **Johnny Kingdom**, and **Fiona Mathews** and **Tim Kendall**, authors of Black Ops and Beaver Bombing, about adventures with British mammals.

In response to Bristol audiences' enthusiasm for political debate, we're bringing back ex-Labour minister **Chris Mullin** to mull over his playfully-titled diaries of 2010-22, Didn't You Use to Be Chris Mullin? Chris also discusses with Guardian journalist and Orwell Prizewinner **Polly Toynbee** her memoir about social mobility, An Uneasy Inheritance: My Family and Other Radicals. Former BBC reporter **Martin Sixsmith** (author of Philomena, filmed by Stephen Frears with Steve Coogan and Judi Dench), presents his book The War of Nerves, about the end of perestroika and the Soviet Union. We also present **Onyeka Nubia**, historian of Africans in pre-colonial England, celebrating the multiple voices of England's history, and **Sian Norris** on her chilling study of US and UK anti-abortion groups, Bodies Under Siege.

Bristol has long been a centre of creative arts, so **Peter Lord**, co-founder of Aardman (Wallace and Gromit, Shaun the Sheep and more) recounts the company's amazing international successes, while renowned photographer **Jem Southam** shows and reflects on his photographs of Bristol's docks and harbourside.

We have a feast of literary events. Three of Bristol's brilliant independent booksellers share with the audience their Desert Island Books. **Lennie Goodings**, award-winning Chair of Virago Press, will be talking to **Helen Taylor** about Virago's 50th anniversary year and its astonishing impact on publishing. Two longtime Bristolians, **Laura Shepherd-Robinson** and Sunday Times literary editor **Johanna Thomas-Corr**, talk about Laura's latest celebrated crime novel, The Square of Sevens. **Moses McKenzie** introduces his novel about growing up black in Bristol, An Olive Grove in Ends. We have an afternoon of dynamic poetry from both sides of the Severn Estuary, and if you want to try your hand at creative writing, BBC radio drama producer/abridger **Sara Davies** and novelist **Lilv Dunn** will show you how. Popular **Clare Reddaway** returns to take you on new Clifton literary walks.

Finally, we have three great musical events. On Saturday, there's the premier of pianist and composer **Sandie Middleton**'s multimedia exploration of our elemental relationship with the land and the sea, while fun band. **The Harrisons** play a collection of favourite covers to lift spirits. On Sunday evening to close the LitFest, Irish folk/jazz band **Carmina 3** give an inspired performance of their own folk songs and poetry.

What can a grave tell us about a person and past lives? From the Bronze Age to the Romans and the Anglo-Saxons, Alice Roberts explores how burial archaeology sheds light on ancient societies, and looks at how genetics is completely revolutionising what we know about the past.

Professor Alice Roberts is a biological anthropologist, author and

broadcaster. Having originally studied and practised medicine, she then became a university lecturer, teaching clinical anatomy and undertaking research in biological anthropology. She is especially interested in the intersection between biology, archaeology and history, the impact of ancient genomics in archaeology, and the interaction between humans and the environment through time.

Alice has recently presented various television series including **Digging for Britain**, **Time Team** and **Britain's most Historic Towns** 

Alice went to school in Bristol and achieved her PhD at Bristol University, and lives locally.

# **DOUG ALLAN** WHALE MEET AGAIN

Doug Allan has filmed whales in Antarctica, off coral reefs, among the giant kelp in California and under the Arctic pack ice. Finding them depends on co-operation with scientists, skilled boat handlers on location, a special patience, and even a healthy dose of luck. Doug describes his most memorable moments in their company, when he's witnessed some remarkable insights into their behaviour and intelligence. We know we can talk to dogs or horses, can you also whisper to a whale?

The world for whales is changing - climate breakdown is affecting the oceans. What does the future hold for the biggest animals on the planet?

Doug's photographic awards include eight Emmys and five BAFTAs. He has three Honorary Doctorates in recognition of his camerawork, as well as two Polar Medals. He's an Honorary Fellow of the Royal Scottish Geographical Society and of the Royal Photographic Society and was awarded the RSGS Mungo Park Medal for outstanding contribution to geographical knowledge through exploration.

# JONATHAN BRADLEY AND YEALAND KALFAYAN THE CARDINAL CLEOPATRA AND THE PASHA

# JEN REID In conversation with PAULA O'ROURKE

Jen Reid tells her story of the events leading up to the Black Lives Matter protest in Bristol that saw the statue of 17th century Slave Trader Edward Colston toppled and thrown into the nearby harbour and how she became a symbol of the protest.

In the early morning of 15th July 2020, a statue by world renown sculptor, Marc Quinn was added to the empty plinth. The statue, titled **A Surge of Power** (Jen Reid) 2020, depicts Jen Reid, raising her arm in a Black Power salute. In the 24 hours it stood, it became a defining global symbol for the BLM movement. Months later, it is still raising conversations and inspiring people to learn more about the structural racial inequalities that have been ignored for too long. By raising her head above the precipice with her spontaneous act, Jen Reid captured a moment which would change the course of history.

Beavers in Bedminster, boar and pine martens in the Forest of Dean, bats in Bath's stone mines - our wild mammals are making a long-overdue comeback across the West Country. Yet a quarter of Britain's native mammal species are threatened with extinction, which is why Fiona and Tim criss-cross Britain on a pilgrimage to find them. All the while, they're answering the big questions. Why was Shakespeare terrified of hedgehogs? How can we persuade grey squirrels to use contraception? And does pine marten poo really smell of parma violets? Their book, **Black Ops and Beaver Bombing, Adventures with Britain's Wild Mammals**, was shortlisted for the prestigious Wainwright Prize (Conservation).

Fiona is Chair of Mammal Conservation Europe and author of the **UK's Red List for mammals**; Tim writes about the cultural history of our wildlife. Despite the slow torture of collaborating on a lockdown book together, they're still married.

# **CLIVE BURLTON**

Shortly after writing his first book, **Trenches to Trams**, Clive co-founded Bristol Books, the not-for-profit local publisher in 2012.

Since then, he has written four further books and co-authored three others. He has curated several exhibitions; produced local films; runs tours to the Western Front battlefields and is a regular speaker to community groups across the city. Clive is a Trustee of the Friends of Bristol Museums, Galleries & Archives charity.

In **Bristol's Lost City**, Clive tells the remarkable story of the Bristol International Exhibition of 1914 and how the site it occupied was transformed by the War Office for use as a barracks. Part trade fair, part theme park, the Exhibition was already failing financially before the war closed it for good.

The well-illustrated talk includes unique film footage of Bristol in 1914, the playing of a local recruitment song, and a display of objects produced for the Exhibition.

# JONATHAN WALKER D-DAY, ARNHEM & THE RHINE - A GLIDER PILOT'S STORY

After studying Photography at the London College of Printing he moved back to Bristol and worked at Arnolfini between 1976 and 1982. It was during this time he undertook his first photographic study of the dockland landscape and its remaining harbour infrastructure. This was exhibited in the city and a book co-authored with John Lord was published by Redcliff Press in 1983. He will show examples of his photos and discuss his representation of Bristol docks with Derrick Price.

Jem subsequently began a teaching career in Cornwall and Devon, during which he

continued to make extensive photographic studies of the regions landscapes. These are usually presented as exhibitions and books and include: **The Red River** 1989, **The Raft of Carrots** 1992, **Rockfalls, Rivermouths and Ponds** 2000, **The Painter's Pool** 2004, **The River Winter** 2011, **The Moth** 2017, **Four Winters** 2022.

Pictures from his latest work **A Bend in the River** were exhibited at the RWA earlier this year.

## MARTIN SIXSMITH In conversation with DAVID PARKER

Martin Sixsmith witnessed the end of the Cold War first-hand, reporting for the BBC from Moscow during the presidencies of Gorbachev and Yeltsin. In **The War of Nerves**, he draws on a vast array of archives and sources, as well as his own experiences, to take us into the minds of those affected by the simmering tensions and paranoia on both sides of the Iron Curtain. In framing the Cold War from a psychological perspective, Sixsmith throws fresh light on the personalities of the leaders in the East and West who presided over the conflict, and on the events that came to define it, from the Yalta Conference and the Berlin Airlift to the endgame of perestroika and Soviet implosion.

From 1980 to 1997 he worked for the BBC as the Corporation's correspondent in

Moscow, Washington, Brussels and Warsaw. He is the author of two novels and several works of non-fiction, including **Philomena** (which was the basis for Stephen Frears' acclaimed film starring Steve Coogan and Judi Dench) and **Russia: A 1.000 Year Chronicle of the Wild East**.




